STATE CONVENTION PAN AMERICAN ROUND TABLE OF TEXAS ROBERT DRISCOLL HOTEL

Corpus Christi, Texas April 4-7, 1961

Theme

"UNDERSTANDING THROUGH STUDY"

The Thirtieth Convention of the Pan American Round Tables of Texas met in regular session Wednesday, April 5th, 1961, at 9:30 A. M., in the Hemisphere Room of the Robert Driscoll Hotel, Corpus Christi, Texas, with Mrs. Ben Vaughan, Jr., Director of the Corpus Christi Table, presiding.

Flags of the 21 Pan American Republics and Canada were presented by Boy Scouts. The Star Spangled Banner was sung by Mr. Perry Horine. The Rev. Paul T. Spellman gave the invocation at the Color Services.

Mrs. Ben Vaughan, Jr., gave a few words of greetings and introduced Mr. Elroy King, Mayor of Corpus Christi, who extended a sincere welcome and presented Mrs. W. W. Hawkins, State Director with the key to the City of Corpus Christi.

The State Director gave a gracious response in behalf of the State Organization.

The Thirtieth Convention was officially opened with the formal presentation and adoption of the program presented by the host Table.

The Credentials Committee reported:

- 26 Delegates
- 12 Board members
- 115 Out-of-town members

The Parliamentarian declared a quorum present.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS

The Secretary reported that copies of minutes of Board meeting in San Antonio, October, 1959, had been sent to all State Officers, Table Directors and Alliance Director.

The Treasurer's Report covered a period from May the 1st, 1959, to April 5th, 1961, and reflected the following totals:

This report was adopted on a motion made by Mrs. Claude R. Nobles and seconded by Mrs. Alcot.

Mrs. Arlon J. Wylie, First Associate Director, reported extension work done on the establishment of new Tables but none could be reported as formed at this time.

Mrs. Richard C. Singer, Third Associate Director, reported visiting all the Tables in her Zone, and new contacts made for forming additional Tables.

COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN REPORTS

Mrs. W. W. Ely, Publication Chairman, gave an interesting and informative report on the Publication of Pan Americana Texana under her direction with assistance from Brownsville Table I.

Mrs. Womax of Houston moved to give Mrs. Ely a rising vote of thanks for her splendid work.

Mrs. Albert Fernandez, Director of Brownsville Table I, peresented copies of roster of members of the Texas Tables to be used by the incoming director and publication chairman.

Mrs. Frank Agnew's report of the Education Committee was read by Mrs. Clyde P. Trotter. The Committee's Resolution was referred to the State Board for consideration after a motion by Mrs. Florence J. Scott, seconded by Mrs. A. B. Pumphrey, had carried.

Mrs. Claude R. Nobles, Chairman of the Archives, reported that all State Records were now placed in the Simon Bolivar Library in San Antonio, and that the San Antonio Table was giving the State organization a new steel filing cabinet.

Mrs. Charles Harris II read the three resolutions presented for consideration at the Convention.

Mrs. Chester Bradley, Chairman of the nominating Committee, introduced her committee, explained procedure for selecting officers and presented the slate of officers as follows:

Mrs. W. W. Hawkins appointed Mrs. Wm. Brown, Director of Dallas Table III, as Chairman of the tellers.

Mrs. W. W. Hawkins gave her director's report. She expressed her sincere gratitude for the cooperation and the work of State officers, her committees, and the Tables of the Texas Organization.

The Secretary gave the report from the State Board meeting held April 4th, 1961, at 4:00 P. M., Driscoll Hotel, Corpus Christi.

Mrs. W. W. Ely was called upon to give a word of explanation on the action of the Board in the termination of the National Committee formed to obtain a National Charter.

Mrs. Albert R. Davis read Mrs. Joe Neal's report on the Florence Griswold Scholarship Committee.

The Resolutions were now presented by the State Director for consideration by the Convention.

Mrs. F. W. De Stefano, Parliamentarian, declared 48 qualified voting members.

Mrs. E. B. Peterson made a motion, seconded by Mrs. J. T. Watt, that the resolutions making the Friendship Committee a permanent Committee of State Organization be voted upon.

After an explanation by Mrs. W. P. McComb and other discussion the resolution carried.

Mrs. James C. Nelson moved the adoption, seconded by Mrs. Hart Brown of the resolution asking for the State Convention not to be held during Pan American week. After discussion the resolution was defeated.

A motion to adopt the resolution making changes in the Griswold Scholarship Fund; increasing Griswold Scholarship dues; and placing the expenditures in the State Executive Board; was made by Dr. Pace. It was seconded by Mrs. Richard C. Singer.

There was much discussion and clarification as to what the resolution would mean.

Dr. Pace then moved to refer this resolution to a committee for further study. Mrs. Clyde P. Trotter seconded the motion and it carried.

The secretary read a letter from Mrs. L. G. Waltrip, Past State Director and past Alliance Director in which she sent greetings and best wishes for the success of the Convention.

Mrs. A. B. Pumphrey moved, and Mrs. Albert R. Davis seconded, that the Convention send Mrs. Waltrip a telegram expressing thanks for the greetings and our regret that she could not be with us. The motion carried.

In the absence of Mrs. Cox Orville, State Historian, her report was read by Mrs. Cecil Robinson of McAllen.

The Scrapbooks are on display in the Convention Hall together with a new white leather one presented by Mrs. Cox.

Mrs. W. W. Hawkins read Governor Price Daniel's proclamation for the Texas observance of Pan American Day and Pan American Week.

On a motion made by Mrs. Albert R. Davis the meeting was adjourned at 11:42 A. M.

A delightful luncheon was held at the Corpus Christi Country Club at 1:00 P. M.

Invocation was given by Mrs. Brisa Ailaganeytia of Montevideo.

Mrs. Ben Vaughan, Jr., presided and introduced the honor guests.

Mr. Joe Neal, Director of the International Office of the University of Texas spoke on Latin America of today. He praised the work that Pan American Round Tables are doing and pointed out ways in which we can be of greater service.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The afternoon session was called to order by the Director, Mrs. W. W. Hawkins, at 3:15 P. M.

She presented Miss Edith Sinnett, Treasurer of the Pan American Round Tables Alliance, who in turn spoke on the material which the Alliance had prepared and had presented to each one attending the Convention.

Mrs. Hawkins made special announcement of the school of instructions for the present and incoming directors to be held at 8:30 P. M. in the Convention Hall.

Mrs. E. B. Petersen moved to adjourn.

Adjournment 4:30 P. M.

An interesting boat trip and a delicious box supper were enjoyed by the members in the evening.

NIGHT SESSION

Mrs. Hawkins welcomed Mrs. McHoward from Durango, Mexico, and Mrs. Lucy Yaman from Laredo. Each of the officers present gave an outline of their duties.

Mrs. Hawkins stressed the following eight points for the Table Director:

- 1. Study the History of the Tables.
- 2. Read and acquaint yourself with the State and Alliance Constitution and By-Laws.
- 3. Before leaving this Convention see that the Secretary and the Treasurer have the names of your new Director and Treasurer and their addresses.
 - 4. Mail copy of new year book to all State Officers, Alliance Director, Secretary and Treasurer.
 - 5. Read carefully all communications, this is for a purpose.
 - 6. Look well to your program chairman.

See that your program is Pan American, urge programs of Pan American nature.

7. Have one program during the year with either an Alliance or a State Officer.

8. Give thought to a strong project committee.

The following projects were suggested:

- 1. Scholarships.
- 2. Spanish classes.
- 3. Study of the 22 flags.
- 4. Study of the history and customs of the Latin American Countries.
- 5. Study of the Organization of American States.

Mrs. Hawkins stressed the point that the Pan American Round Table is a nonprofit organization; however, a money raising project can be carried out for the purpose of raising funds for scholarships and sending delegates to Conventions.

Mrs. Hawkins in the discussion of Table membership stressed the following:

Choose new members who are really Pan-American minded not just "joiners". Keep your membership small and interested rather than large and unwieldy. It is better to take in no new members than to just fill your roll with the maximum membership.

Mrs. Arlon Wylie explained the Zoning of the State and the terminology of the associate directors. Meeting adjourned at 9:30 P. M.

THURSDAY, APRIL 6, 1961

The Convention convened at 9:00 A. M. with an Hour of Memory conducted by Mrs. James Dougherty, Sr., Corpus Christi, Texas. This was a beautiful and impressive ceremony.

As the names of the deceased members were read, beautiful flowers were placed in an urn by a daughter or granddaughter escorted by a son or grandson of members of the Corpus Christi Table.

For the closing of the ceremony Mr. Tibereaux sang the Lord's Prayer.

The regular morning session was opened with Mrs. W. W. Hawkins presiding at 9:30 A. M.

The secretary read the minutes of the previous day's session. They were approved as read.

Mrs. W. W. Hawkins appointed Mrs. A. B. Pumphrey and Mrs. Albert R. Davis to send a telegram to Mrs. L. G. Waltrip of Dallas.

Reports of Tables were continued with the following reporting:

Mrs. Ben Vaughan, Jr., Director of the Corpus Christi Texas Table thanked the Rio Grande Table for the use of the flags.

Mrs. Clyde Clark, Dallas made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Olin Smith, to accept the Tables reports as given. Motion carried.

Mrs. Joe Neal as Chairman of the Committee to which the resolution on the Griswold Fund had been referred was asked by the State Director to again present the changes to the Assembly.

A motion was made by Mrs. E. B. Petersen, seconded by Mrs. Charles Harris II, to raise the Griswold dues to \$1.00 per capita. The motion lost.

Dr. Pace moved, seconded by Mrs. A. B. Pumphrey, that the original amount of five thousand dollars of the Griswold Fund shall at all times remain intact. Current income as well as accrued interest from the fund may be used annually.

After much discussion, Mrs. Florence J. Scott, Rio Grande, offered the following amendment to

the motion seconded by Mrs. A. B. Pumphrey to strike out the original amount of five thousand dollars and insert the amount as of this date.

This amendment did not carry.

The motion was referred to a committee composed of Mrs. Joe Neal, Mrs. Florence J. Scott, Mrs. F. W. De Stefano, and Mrs. Clyde P. Trotter, for further study.

Mrs. Hawkins entertained the motion to adjourn. Mrs. W. W. Ely moved, and adjournment was at 11.20 A. M.

A distinctive luncheon was held at 1:00 P. M. in the Petroleum Club with Mrs. Ben Vaughan, Jr. Presiding. Mrs. W. W. Hawkins gave the invocation. The Florence Griswold Scholarship student from Chile Miss Mireya Valencia spoke on her impression of the United States, her work in the University and her sincere appreciation for her scholarship.

The guests were seated according to the Pan American country they represent in their Tables and were delighted with the authentic costumed dolls that were used as decorations.

At 3:45 P. M. the members and visitors boarded buses for the King Ranch. A guided tour by Mrs. Richard Kleberg, Chairman of the Convention, was thoroughly enjoyed and appreciated because her son had arranged to have many of their prize quarter horses and Santa Gertrudis cattle shown.

Following the tour Mrs. Richard Kleberg was hostess to the group for a delicious ranch style supper in the spacious and beautiful home.

MORNING SESSION, FRIDAY APRIL 7, 1961

The Convention was called to order by the State Director, Mrs. W. W. Hawkins at 9:15 A. M. After announcements, the Parliamentarian declared a quorum.

Mrs. Joe Neal reported for the Committee to which the amendment to Griswold Fund amendment part 2 had been referred.

Dr. Pace moved, seconded by Mrs. W. P. McComb, that the amendment to the amendment be accepted. It reads as follows:

Provided that the principal shall at all times remain intact, current income of 25c per capita (The Griswold Fund Dues), as well as accrued interest from the fund may be used annually for a scholarship.

After further discussion on the Griswold Fund amendment, the motion carried.

At this point the Director asked for the reading of the minutes of the previous day. They were approved as read.

Mrs. E. B. Peterson moved, seconded by Mrs. Chester Bradley, to accept the third part of the resolution leaving the expenditure of the current scholarship within the discretion of the State Executive Board.

After discussion, the motion lost.

Mrs. Richard Kleberg, Convention Chairman, gave the final Credentials report.

There were 157 members in attendance with 10 husbands.

Only two Tables were not represented — Edinburg and Bryan-College Station.

The Director appointed Ms. Watson, Dallas III, to serve as Chairman of tellers with Mesdames Albert Fernandez, Carmack and Strickland assisting.

The Secretary read the slate of officers presented by the nominating Committee. The Director asked for nominations from the floor for each offfice.

Mrs. James C. Nelson moved, seconded by Mrs. Hanson, that all officers may be included for voting purposes on one ballot. The motion carried.

Mrs. Watson reported that the slate of officers so presented was unanimously elected.

Mrs. Charles Harris II presented the resolutions, which were adopted.

Mrs. Wm. G. Farrington, of Houston, extended an invitation from the Houston Table, the Houston Mayor and Chamber of Commerce to hold our Thirty-first Convention in Houston in 1963.

Mrs. Ben Vaughan Jr., moved to accept the Houston invitation. The motion was seconded by by Ms. J. T. Watt and carried.

The minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

Carolina Cerna asked for a standing vote of thanks for the State Director, Mrs. W. W. Hawkins, Mrs. Richard Kleberg and Mrs. Thelma Parr, Chairman and Co-Chairman of the Convention, and Mrs. Ben Vaughan, Jr., Director of the Corpus Christi Table.

Mrs. Richard C. Singer asked for a standing vote of thanks for Carolina Cerna, Recording Secretary.

Meeting adjourned at 11:00 A. M.

INSTALLATION LUNCHEON

The installation luncheon took place at the Morocco Room in the Robert Driscoll Hotel.

Invocation was given by Mrs. Richard C. Singer.

The Courtesy Resolutions were read by Mrs. Charles Harris II.

Mrs. A. B. Pumphrey presented the report of the Committee, appointed to have those members who have through the years worked to hold Mrs. Griswold's ideals of the Pan American Round Table movement before the Texas Tables.

The Convention accepted the Committee's report with a standing vote to show appreciation for the services of these distinguished and dedicated women still active in the State Organization.

Mrs. Ben Vaughan presented Mrs. James C. Nelson, San Antonio, founder of the Corpus Christi Table, as installation officer.

Mrs. Nelson led a beautiful and impressive ceremony originally prepared for use of the San Antonio Table by Mrs. Claude R. Nobles.

As the charge to each officer was given a corsage was removed from a Texas Map of Flowers and presented to the officer.

Following the installation ceremony Mrs. W. W. Hawkins read a telegram from Mrs. D'Arcy M. Cashin, to the Convention; then Mrs. W. W. Ely, Brownsville, in behalf of the State Organization, presented a State Directors pin to Mrs. W. W. Hawkins.

Mrs. Dan Matheson, Ft. Worth Table Director, presented Mrs. Arlon J. Wylie, incoming State Director, a bouquet of yellow roses from her Table..

Mrs. A. B. Pumphrey Fort Worth, presented Mrs. Wylie with a State Directors' pin.

Mrs. Wylie gave her pledge, and loyalty, and accepted full responsibility for her office.

Installation luncheon was adjourned at 2:30 P. M. with a blessing by Mrs. Kenneth McKamey, member of the Corpus Christi Table.

REPORT OF ACTIVITIES, THIRD ASSOCIATE DIRECTOR, STATE OF TEXAS

- 1. In March of 1960 Mrs. Hawkins, our State Director, wrote me telling me that Mrs. W. W. Lake, 269 Pendale Rd., El Paso, Texas, was interested in organizing a Table in Ysleta and asked that I send her the Frame Work Constitution which I did on March 25th. About April 12th I received an answer to my letter, but have had no further word.

In February 1%1 I wrote Mrs. Fernandez, Director of Table I in Brownsville, suggesting if possible that she try to arrange a joint meeting of Tables I and II of Brownsville and the Table in San Benito.

A joint meeting was held in Brownsville on March 21st to which the Director of the Table in San Benito, Miss Roots, and several other members came. There were about 65 members in attendance.

At the same time I also wrote Mrs. Leonard Johnson, Director of the Alamo-San Juan Table making the same suggestion concerning a meeting of the Tables in the upper valley.

That meeting was arranged for March 22nd in McAllen and the Directors and members from the Tables in Alamo-San Juan, Edinburg, McAllen and Rio Grande City were all present, - also several guests from Donna.

The coordination and enthusiasm shown at both meetings was evidence that they are all working for the ideals of the Pan-American Round Table.

Madam Director.

Delegates and members of the Pan American Round Tables of Texas;
As Publication Chairman, I submit the following report;

We edited and mailed 4 issues of the Pan Americana Texana, mailing a total of approximately 5,000 copies. We plan a post-convention issue in April, following a precedent set by the immediate past Chairman of Publications, of the Conroe Table.

At the expense of the Publication Chairman, copies of the Texana, as available, were mailed to all Table Directors outside of Texas, to all Alliance Officers and to the Pan American Union, Columbia University, Americas, Latin American Reports and other publications and individuals whom we thought might be interested. This was no expense to the State Tables as we used the extra copies which the printer gave to us.

Cur success ig getting the Post Office Dep't. to grant to The Pan American Round Tables of Texas non-profit mailing status is, we think, our most important contribution as Publication Chairman. This required no little effort as we had to furnish to the P.O.Dep't copies of our State Charter, contilution.

Our State charter and a letter from the Internal Revenue absolving us from taxes. This status is now permenant unless we should the type of our organization. These papers will be given to the new Chairman of Publications. Their has been some mis-information relative to an address-6-graph system. The P.A.R.T. of Texas does not own a machine, rather they have a set of stenciled names which are not current. For this reason and because we did not have access to a machine in Brownsville, we did not use the stencils. We shall turn them over to our successor and it may be with corrections some of the stencils will be usable. We found it simpler and not too much work when we divided the addressing among our staff.

Mrs. W. W. Hawkins, State Director, Pan American Round Tables of Texas, Corpus Christi, Texas.

Dear Mrs. Hawkins:

The sime of your Education Committee for the past two years were twofold:

- 1. To try to influence and work with the Superintendants of public schools, the School Boards and the heads of the Spanish Departments to have Spanish taught as a required subject in the Texas schools. We felt the first place to start was in our home town of El Paso, which probably has the most crying need for this program since our population is more than fifty per cent. Spanish speaking, and
- 2. To consider the advisability of awarding scholarships to students from the Hispano American countries.

As for the first aim - Spanish to be taught on a compulsory basis in 1955 the El Paso schools embarked upon an after school program for the
teaching of Spanish to students by request. This was in lieu of the
twenty minute Spanish classes held twice a week for the first three grades
which was given to all students from 1951-1955. This did not accomplish
the desired aim because there was no grouping of students according to
fluency in the language and only those who were intent upon learning

Spanish benefitted by it. However, the after school method proved quite satisfactory because those who wanted Spanish were given it. Also, it was much more economical because the teachers used are itinerant, though well qualified, who are paid on an hourly basis.

However, beginning September, 1961 a new experiment will be inaugurated whereby three grade schools will have Spanish included in the regular curriculum - twenty minute periods for grades one through three and forty-five minute periods for grades four through seven. This is a big step forward, and a resolution has been prepared by your Education Committee in the name of the Pan American Round Tables of Texas commending this program and offering our full support, a copy of which is attached. We strongly urge the adoption of this resolution at this convention. A detailed report of the methods to be put into effect in September, plus the methods now being used, is attached hereto. We should like to recommend these methods to all Texas school systems who have not already established a Spanish program. Incidentally, Mr. Carlos Rivera, Supervisor of Foreign Languages of the El Paso public schools, has given invaluable aid in the preparation of the attached report.

As for the second aim, we considered recommending a schotarship to some Mexican student who had been investigated, but we found that there are many scholarships available in many organizations but they have few applicants because students want cash - not loans to be paid back after receiving their educations. This would seem important in order to keep funds revolving.

However, through the Good Neighbor Commission with Dr. V. J. Kennedy, Director of Curriculum Development of the Texas Educational Agency at Austin, Texas there are scholarships already set up with Mexico on a reciprocal basis. The scholarships have not been used for lack of housing

for the Mexican students in American homes. A full explanation is enclosed in the attached report. Our recommendation is: that a committee be appointed among the members of every Pan American Round Table group in Texas to find homes for these students so that these scholarships can be used.

We have felt that until our own house was put in order we had nothing to recommend to others, especially concerning the teaching of Spanish in grade schools. However, now that El Paso seems to have a forward looking program we do have something to recommend to other Tables in Texas.

Along with this report is a newspaper file of articles and editorials that have appeared in El Paso and other newspapers.
